N-Computing Technology

Dinwiddie County Public Schools (DCPS) needed more computers in the classrooms and additional computer labs. One new technology that has been incorporated is NComputing desktop virtualization, which allows one CPU to act as 10 or more computers. This technology has enabled Dinwiddie County schools to put far more



computers in classrooms and labs at only a fraction of the cost! At the time of initial implementation, NComputing did not have a school system that used these devices for online testing in Virginia as a reference. Dinwiddie County Public Schools used two of these labs for the Fall 2009 online SOL testing and they exceeded all expectations! **DCPS** believes that this innovative technology can help all schools with their technology needs and goals. 

#### Mecklenburg County: Communication and Collaboration Across the Globe

students across the globe. Classes at Elementary, Buckhorn Chase City Elementary, Park View Middle, Bluestone High, Park View High, and the Alternative Education Center were part of a global initiative to bring students from all over the world together. Sheila Beck, Google Implementation Specialist, organized the project through iEarn, a non-profit, worldwide, collaborative organization that has participating educators in countries. Students created an array of Christmas items to send to classes in Russia, Arkansas, Ohio, Sweden, and Costa Rica. The teachers and students communicated with teachers and students in the other classes through a forum on the



iEarn webpage. Students sent banners, Christmas cards. video cards. and ornaments as a representation of what looks like Mecklenburg Christmas in County, Virginia. Each class received a care package in return with Christmas items from their pen-pal. The goal of the communication established in the project is to build a relationship with the partnering schools that will continue after the Christmas Card Project.
